


Geographic Location

Lake Ozette and Ozette Village site on south end.










500 year old Ozette basket, checker weave





Fourteen oil spills off North Olympic Peninsula, 1993 to 2003

Over the course of 11 years, 14 oil tankers spilled a total of 1.2 million gallons of oil into the waters off the coast of the North Olympic Peninsula. The spills caused significant damage to the local ecosystem and the Makah people's traditional whaling activities.
